Dear Friends of pARTners,

Stepping into the position of Board President this year, I reflect on my history with pARTners: twelve years as an artistteacher and four as a board member. Those roles have given me a unique perspective on the organization.

From my first project introducing sketch-journaling to 2nd graders, to teaching 8th graders how to transform personal beliefs and influences into expressive self-portrait collages, to creating multimedia presentations in Spanish about Latin artists with high school students. I have never tired of witnessing the intimate connections students make to a subject through the art-making process. Observing students problem-solve creatively and watching as their imaginations work towards innovative ideas that turn concepts into something tangible is beyond gratifying for all involved. These classroom "eureka!" moments are evidence of how valuable art is in education. Art provides a gateway for visual, auditory and kinesthetic learning that piques curiosity in a very individual way. This is what keeps me passionately advocating for arts-based learning.

Always resourceful, pARTners has evolved and adapted to changes in our community and schools by working with teachers and artists to reassess current projects and develop new ones. Projects explore varied curriculum topics such as diversity, cultural, social, political and environmental issues. Three of the eight new projects this year included the 1st grade project at Munger Mountain Elementary School that explored Latino culture through the Huichol yarn project, the 3rd grade project used bookmaking to document personal changes through time, and the 10th grade project that used flash fiction photo transfers to study Jackson Hole history. All the pARTners projects are described in our annual report which is packed full of testimonials, facts, and descriptions highlighting the positive impacts on students and teachers in Teton County schools.

It does indeed take a village to build a successful organization such as pARTners, and we are grateful for the support of Teton County school teachers and administrators, artists, collaborators, parents, students, donors, volunteers and friends. We look forward to your

continued support so that we can provide even more opportunities for our students to explore the world through arts-based learning.

The Board wishes to recognize and thank our talented and enthusiastic Executive Director, Ruth Moran for all of her hard work keeping pARTners vibrant, innovative, and organized. And with deep gratitude, we say farewell to Board President, Liz King, for all the expertise and sensibility she has brought to the board for the last eight years.

Program Structure

pARTners integrates the arts into Teton County curriculum by administering two distinct programs: Educator Project Grants and Integrated Arts Projects.



Journal Collage 2nd Grade

Educator Project Grants provide educators with funding to design and implement arts-based learning projects that fulfill curriculum goals in collaboration with pARTners-approved artists. All artist planning and teaching time, as well as project materials, are funded by pARTners. Through the Educator Project Grants program, pARTners served 1,135 students this year.

Integrated Arts Projects are recurring programs that occur across whole grade levels (K-12) all over Teton County, impacting approximately 1,865 students! These projects share a common mission: the integration of arts education across all academic disciplines, enhancing student creativity and innovation.

During the 2019-20 school year, pARTners will again work in the following schools: Teton County School District #1, Journeys School, Jackson Hole Community School, C-Bar-V and JH Classical Academy.






Changes over Time: Community Book Project

The Eyes Project


Students learned how to draw eyes and use shading, color, and other techniques to create depth and perspective. They explored the symbolism of eyes in order to better understand that there are multiple perspectives present in any situation.

This project has a lasting effect. I continue to find students drawing eyes for the rest of the school year. As we read, we look for "eye moments" when authors describe a character's eyes to help the reader better understand their inner world. William Shakespeare once said, "The eyes are the window to your soul," and this project helps students explore that idea more.

The American Dream Project

Students read and examined articles, short stories, and novels that focused on adversity, diversity and the concept of the "American Dream". Students refer to and quote the posters often throughout the remainder of the year. Art has a way of making us understand things that words cannot. 


