

Message from the board

Dear Friends of pARTners,

We have all said it and heard it, but it's worth repeating: this year was like no other! Who would have predicted that students would end the 2020 school year learning virtually from their homes? Who would have predicted that they would spend the 2020-2021 school year in masks and cohorts and pods and, unfortunately, at times, in quarantine. We could not have predicted a global pandemic, but we could have predicted that art and community would be the key to surviving, and for some thriving, during this difficult time.

pARTners relies on collaborative relationships that strengthen community through the process of making and celebrating art. So while the pandemic demanded we do things differently, it only reinforced why we do what we do. Art helps people process our internal and external worlds. Art allows us to communicate with ourselves and others. Art - especially public art - allows us to honor collective thinking, emotions, and heros. Art matters.

Our annual report will share our numbers and statistics. It will show you how we delivered art supplies to the homes of students in Teton County. It will share how pARTners artists created instructional videos and learned to use zoom to support budding artists. But equally important to the numbers and statistics are the stories from the classroom that touch our hearts and truly capture the mission of pARTners.

We love the stories that reveal the generosity of a community motivated to keep our students engaged in the arts. Donations allowed us to deliver art supplies to neighborhoods when classrooms were not available. A student emailed her teacher after receiving her art supplies via the TCSD bus route drop off system. She sheepishly explained that the drawing she had attached to the email was completed using the colored pencils pARTners supplied. She asked if that was okay. "I've been so lonely and sad. When I saw them there, I just started drawing. I drew like 100 pictures. I put this picture on my mom's door and she finally smiled." This reminds us that when facing adversity, we can turn to art. When others are facing adversity, we can share art

pARTners is ever grateful to the Jackson Hole and Wyoming community for supporting our nonprofit work of integrating the ARTS into the education of Teton County students. This year required resourcefulness and tightening our belt. Our ever capable and imaginative Executive Director Ruth Moran has kept pARTners on solid financial ground. She collaborated and developed new relationships with diverse organizations to keep our art community flourishing.

Art helps us to see the world differently. When we see the world differently, we recognize the power of seeing. How we see is as important as what we see. Becoming artists is not as much the products created as the resulting vision. Communities need artists – especially during challenging times when it's easy to miss seeing beauty in the world. Our integrated arts projects are a much-needed learning tool that invites students to explore subjects with open, creative minds resulting in original, inspired solutions that in turn makes our community a richer one. pARTners is committed to supporting the Jackson Hole community by creating artists.

Program Structure

pARTners integrates the arts into Teton County curriculum by administering two distinct programs: **Educator Project Grants** and **Integrated Arts Projects**.



Educator Project Grants provide educators with funding to design and implement arts-based learning projects that fulfill curriculum goals in collaboration with pARTners-approved artists. All artist planning and teaching time, as well as project materials, are funded by pARTners. pARTners served **550 students** this year through the Educator Project Grants program.




Integrated Arts Projects are recurring programs that occur across whole grade levels (K-12) in TCSD#1, impacting approximately **1,850 students**! These projects share a common mission: the integration of arts education across all academic disciplines, enhancing student creativity and innovation.

During the 2021-22 school year, pARTners will again work in the following schools: Teton County School District #1, Mountain Academy, Jackson Hole Community School, C-Bar-V, JH Classical Academy, and the Homeschool Community.



Careers in the Arts


JES | CES | WES | MMES Students learned about different arts careers, with classroom visits from a local architect, graphic designer and documentary filmmaker.

Symbolic Portraits **CES**

The American Dream Project

Students read and examined articles, short stories, and novels that focused on adversity, diversity and the concept of the "American Dream." They created a poster that addressed an issue related to accessing the American Dream. The issue and solution came to life through symbols, colors, and words.

During the Spring of 2020, we faced not only a pandemic, but also social unrest. The 6th grade American Dream project teaches students about graphic arts. It helps students understand elements of graphic design in order to decipher the message of the visuals that flood their social media feeds. Thomas reflected, "I feel like I learned a secret language. I understand why they are using the colors and shapes. I understand the messages faster than if they are talking." Art communicates. When we teach students how to read art, we teach them to be more empowered thinkers and actors in the world.


