## Dear Friends of pARTners,

pARTners began in 1994 as a response to arts funding cuts nationwide and the recognition of the critical need for arts education in all Teton County classrooms. In its 30th year, we are impacting over 1,130 students through art integration in Teton County.

We were thrilled to be recognized by the Town of Jackson in May with a proclamation and to acknowledge the Teton County School Board and its TCSD #1 leadership for their support over the last 30 years.

Quality art education in school classrooms fosters creativity, critical thinking, and innovation, which are fundamental skills across all disciplines, including science, math, and STEM.

Art encourages students to explore, experiment, and express themselves, honing problem-solving abilities essential for scientific inquiry and mathematical reasoning.

From our second grade project discussing Indigenous art and culture to our middle school screen printing class with a Mexico City artist, the programs pARTners curates with artists and teachers bring a more profound element to learning and connections.

By integrating art into STEM education, students develop a holistic understanding of the interconnectedness of disciplines, fostering thinking crucial for addressing real-world challenges and driving technological advancements.

We are beyond grateful to the artists painters, sculptors, poets, writers, potters, screen printers and more—whose time and talent fuel the fires of creativity on each project. The arts were vital to my childhood and now adulthood, and I am grateful for the opportunities I had to explore creative forces and learn new ways to develop skills and enrich my lived experiences.

The importance of art education is as critical as it was in 1994. Tapping into our creative mind provides pathways to connections, learning and understanding that will build upon each other throughout our lives.

We hope you continue to support this work and the need for integrated arts in every classroom and for every student.

## Goals

### Provide access to quality arts education for ALL students.

pARTners funds, designs, and implements a wide variety of creative and academic arts education programs by introducing community artists into Teton County classrooms.

### Raise awareness of the value of arts education.

Through consistent communication about our innovative arts programming, pARTners demonstrates the importance of the arts in nurturing well-rounded, successful students. Research shows that the integration of the arts into curriculum positively impacts student achievement.

### Secure resources to expand and sustain arts education.

Consistent funding allows pARTners to increase the variety of projects offered, and ensures that our arts curriculum remains relevant and aligned with educational standards and demands.

## PROGRAM STRUCTURE

pARTners integrates the arts into Teton County curriculum by administering two distinct programs: **Educator Project Grants** and **Integrated Arts Projects**.



Integrated Arts Projects are recurring programs that occur across whole grade levels (K-12) in TCSD#1, impacting approximately 2,400 students! These projects share a common mission: the integration of arts education across all academic disciplines, enhancing student creativity and innovation.


**Educator Project Grants** provide educators with funding to design and implement arts-based learning projects that fulfill curriculum goals in collaboration with pARTners-approved artists. All artist planning and teaching time, as well as project materials, are funded by pARTners. pARTners served **331 students this year** through the Educator Project Grants program.



# Learning about Light through Kaleidoscopes

Students worked with pARTners artists to construct and decorate their own kaleidoscopes. This creative project supports their science standard on how light reflects off different surfaces. They also learn that the smaller the angle, the more reflection they observe in their kaleidoscope.

Eugene Ridgebear, the Culture Resource Specialist of the Northern Arapahoe Tribe, visited 2nd grade classrooms to teach the vital role that the buffalo plays in native cultures. He shared various items (tools, clothes, parfleches, ceremonial items) that the tribes make using the buffalo. Students then created the own parfleche (carrying container) with Arapahoe symbols.

## **Tipi Education and Art**

Eugene Ridgebear, the Culture Resource Specialist of the Northern Arapahoe Tribe, visited 2nd graders at Colter Elementary to talk to the students about the form and function of tipis. First, students made small watercolor tipis to practice the creative artform specific to the Northern Arapahoe culture. They then worked in small groups with pARTners artists to decorate larger canvas tipis based on native symbols and stories they had written.

# Torn paper Landscapes and Animals

### **MMES**

Students were tasked with creating landscapes using torn paper, without using scissors. They learned how to collage and layer paper to add depth and texture to the background. Then, they learned to use shapes as a guide for drawing animals. Finally, they used markers and watercolors to make their animals bold and stand out in the landscape.

He also returned for another visit to discuss the significance of the buffalo in Native cultures, showcasing various items made from the animal's hide. After his presentation, the kids created parfleches—bags or suitcases made from buffalo hide and adorned with Native symbols."


# Ecology of the Greater Yellowstone Nature Journals


